



Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner's Training

Our Outreach Efforts

The Marshall University Forensic Science Center (MUFSC) is pleased to offer adult and pediatric Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner's (SANE) training to the nursing community.



Adult SANE Training is a 40-hour didactic course geared towards the Registered Nurse, but is informative for physicians, law enforcement officers, prosecutors, and victim advocates. It is designed to provide a comprehensive education program in the complete assessment, evaluation, and treatment of the adult sexual assault survivor.

Upon completion of the 40-hour didactic training, there is a post-training clinical requirement that must be completed according to the nurse's scope of practice and guidelines of the training course.

Days 1, 2, and 5 are suggested for prosecutors, law enforcement officers, and victims advocates. RNs **MUST** attend ALL five days of the training to receive contact hours. This course meets the educational guidelines of the International Association of Forensic Nurses.

Pediatric SANE Training is designed to provide nurses who have attended and completed the requirements of a basic Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner Training Course with knowledge specific to the pediatric sexual assault examination. This intense seminar will include 32 or 40 hours of specialized training.



This training does not "certify" the nurse to perform pediatric sexual assault exams. Satisfactory completion indicates that the nurse has attended the training. Post clinical requirements will be recommended and that will become the responsibility of the nurse to arrange after the didactic course.

Presenters

Dr. Linda E. Ledray administers **Adult SANE Training**. Dr. Ledray, PhD, RN, FAAN, SANE-A, developed the Sexual Assault Resource Service in Minneapolis in 1977 and has been the director since its establishment. One of Dr. Ledray's greatest accomplishments is a nursing-focused service delivery model that provides responsive treatment for sexual assault survivors. There are currently more than 120 functioning SANE programs across the country. Dr. Ledray has taught nationally and internationally on sexual assault issues and has authored the book, "Recovering From Rape".

Diana Faugno (RN, MSN, CPN, FAAFS, SANE-A, SANE-P) administers **Pediatric SANE Training** and has received undergraduate and Master's degrees in nursing and is currently a Board Director of EAW International as well as a per diem contract staff nurse for the Eisenhower Medical Center SART team.

Her past nursing experience includes: Medical/Surgical, Labor and Delivery, Pediatrics, and Neonatal Intensive Care. She is the former District Director of a child abuse program, sexual assault team, and a family violence program. She is a charter-founding member of the International Association of Forensic Nurses (IAFN). In 1996, she received the Outstanding Achievement award at the IAFN National Conference in Kansas City, MO.

Ms. Faugno is the co-author of *Color Atlas of Sexual Assault* (Mosby Publications 1997), *Sexual Assault across the Life Span* (GW Medical 2003), and numerous other publications.
